III. Speakers: CYD SMILIE, ARTS ALIVE CHICAGO, ALDERMAN JOHN ARENA

CYD SMILIE, ARTS ALIVE CHICAGO

The tenure of two sculptures is ending in Jefferson Park at the end of March (Milwaukee & Lawrence and outside of RepChi). Arts Alive Chicago is seeking donations to total \$3,500, the total cost to install and insure one sculpture, including a small stipend for the artist. BONUS: if the goal is met by April, TWO sculptures will be placed in the neighborhood. A collection box was circulated at the meeting for the sculpture program and approximately \$100 was raised during the meeting towards this goal.

Real Estate Developments in Jefferson Park-update

Two new residential developments are proposed for downtown Jefferson Park, a four story building at 5201 W. Lawrence Avenue (Lawrence & Laramie) and a 12 story building at 4850 N. Lipps Avenue (Ainslie & Lipps). Alderman Arena described the appeal of these buildings for 20-somethings, as well as empty-nesters. Situated near the transit center, cars are not necessary for everyone, at least not for every trip. 20-somethings rent to get a start, buy a single family home, staying for schools and parks, and bring new vitality and buying power to the area. Empty-nesters leave single family homes for simplified living and want to stay in their neighborhood. Currently, there is a resurgence of home buying in Jefferson Park, which is driving development all along Milwaukee Ave.

“Gateway” building at 5201 W. Lawrence

- 39 residential units
- 10,000 square feet for retail
- 41 parking spaces
- Input welcome on how to “activate” the public space at the north end of the small parking lot bordered by Lawrence, Laramie and Avondale, which will have some public space provided along Lawrence Avenue. Send suggestions to ward45@cityofchicago.org
- Tentative building timeline: Planning Commission in March, permits, break ground by May.

4850 N. Lipps

- 6 residential floors with 96 units
- 255 parking spaces
- Changes to original concept include step-down style building (12 stories, to 10 stories, to step down to transit center)
- Approximately 10,000 square feet of commercial space on ground floor along Ainslie Street.
- Planned Unit Development zoning code allows developer (Mega Properties) to correct issues related to Veterans Square, particularly the removal of Veterans Square dumpsters from the public sidewalk on Lipps Avenue.
- Residential entrance moved to AinslieStreet

Open Forum/Discussion:

- CTA Project – “Your New Blue” -- improvements from Grand Ave. to O’Hare. Jefferson Park terminal improvements include: replacement of entry canopy, new lighting, new paving. Station improvements include new escalators and stairs, new lighting, and refinishing of all surfaces. Platform improvements include new canopy skylight system, new lighting, and repairs and refinishing of all surfaces. Installation of public art. Altogether, this represents a \$25M investment in the terminal.
- RTA Study: The Alderman’s Office was successful in obtaining a planning grant from the Regional Transportation Authority to conduct a transit-oriented development (TOD) study around the Jefferson Park Transit Station. This \$100k study requires a 20% local match, which is being acquired from the Jefferson Park TIF district. The project should kick off in Summer and will have opportunities for public input. JPF has expressed its desire to be a stakeholder in the plan.
- CTA and CDOT are working together to stripe Milwaukee Ave. from Lawrence Ave. to Foster with crosswalks and bike lanes.

- Old firehouse building at the south east corner of Lipps and Ainslie being studied for potential Gift Theater location
- Three new Divvy bike stations are coming to Six Corners this summer at Old Irving Park, Irving Park and the Grayland Metra Station. Divvy Stations are placed by “building” on themselves and must be no further than ½ mile from each other.
- \$60,000 allocated by the city for striping bike lanes on Milwaukee from Addison to Lawrence as part of Participatory Budgeting.

IV. OTHER BUSINESS

- Representatives of JPF attended the February Jefferson Park Chamber of Commerce luncheon. Of note, the Small Business Improvement Fund has funding available for area businesses’ physical improvement. For example, The Copernicus Center acquired funding for roof repairs and solar panels. - Neighbors are concerned about people that are homeless in the area. The city and Hands to Help Ministries are in contact with people needing help to connect them with resources, including the recent arrival of a man on Montrose at the Metra tracks. Many neighbors expressed concern about him are advised to contact Hands To Help Ministries at 773-599-9370 or www.handstohelpministries.org. Neighbors can also call 911 and ask that the police conduct a well-being check on any person who is homeless.
