Used & new batteries	All Home Depot locations and most Lowe's stores recycle batteries of all types as well as fluorescent lights and LED's... Alderman Arena's office has a battery recycling bucket.
Styrofoam packaging materials (panels, inserts in which TV's and other small appliances come packed)	Abt. Electronics 1200 N. Milwaukee Ave. Glenview, IL 60025 847.967.8830 Drive around to the delivery/truck area on on West side of the building, and ring the buzzer...someone comes to assist. Abt accepts <u>WHITE styrofoam only</u> for its re-use as packing peanuts and padding.
Fluorescent lighting tubes	All Home Depot & most Lowe's locations; (bring them taped together in bundles if you have several)...containers are in the store entry areas.
Household Chemicals and Computers (bleach, oil-based paint, medication, propane tanks, motor oil, fire extinguishers, cell phones, computers, televisions, and much more)	City of Chicago Recycling Facility, 1150 N. Latex Paint	Add kitty litter, sawdust, shredded paper, drywall compound, etc. to absorb and dry the paint, and throw entire can in the normal garbage when paint is dry.
Misc metals, old bikes, sections of pipe & conduit, lawn chairs with metal frames, bed frames, mowers, broken tools etc.	Our active network of alley "scrappers" makes sure all metals (and many other items) are either recycled for cash, or re-used. Scrap metal prices for mixed steel are way down, but copper, brass and aluminum are highly valued. It's not uncommon for an item placed next to or (for attention) on top of garbage cans on non-collection days to be gone within two hours!...and it helps these licensed and hard-working guys make a living!
Wine Corks	All Whole Foods locations welcome natural wine corks (bagged or loose) in a cardboard floor display in their wine dept. These are also free for the taking if you want to line the bottom of a planter (saves weight on decks, or with large indoor houseplants,

	<p>...and corks also make great slingshot ammo! (paint them red so you can find them later) We've also mixed them with wood chips for mulch.</p>
<p>Cellular Phones</p>	<p>Best Buy (limit 3 items daily) and Lowe's both accept phones for recycling. If the phone is still usable and has its charger there are dozens of non-profits (such as domestic abuse-related and military) that accept them for reprogramming and new uses.</p>
<p>Shredded office paper</p>	<p>North Park Village Recycling Center 5801 North Pulaski Road Chicago, Illinois 60646 (773) 821-1351 Hours: 9–5 pm daily Shredded office paper is NOT OK for Blue Bins, but you can bring it here. They also recycle all the usual stuff, but please don't leave things after hours. Scrap metal items of modest size also OK. This is not a City site, but a non-profit, so a small donation is helpful.</p>
<p>Clothing, CD's, books, household items with continuing value</p>	<p>Thrift stores sort, price and "recycle" billions of dollars of material each year. In our area two drop-off locations are worth noting: Juvenile Diabetes Research Fdn. partners with Village Discount Outlets (our location 4635 N. Elston, in the VDO parking lot). Your donations are resold through VDO's many locations, and proceeds go directly to JDRF Hours are Mon-Sat. 9-6pm for the drop-off. Used bikes and trikes	<p>Working Bikes Cooperative is a great non-profit serving the entire city. 2434 S. Western Ave. 773-847-5440</p> <p>Call or check website for drop-off hours or current NW side drop-off sites. http://www.workingbikes.org/</p> <p>“While we prefer that you drop off your bicycles, if you are unable to transport them or if you have a larger number of bikes we may be able to arrange to pick them up. To contact us about a potential pick up, email us or call 773-847-5440 during business hours. If there’s no answer please leave us a voicemail and we’ll get back to you as soon as possible!”</p> <p>Bikes are reconditioned and repaired by volunteers, then sold at low cost locally or send abroad to several countries, where having a bike makes a world of difference to workers and families.</p>

Kitchen waste & food scraps	<p>Compost Club offers a service in which you bring in a 5 gallon bucket of your accumulated waste monthly to a Farmers Market location (our nearest Logan Sq) and get a new clean bucket (\$5). The waste is composted at local urban farm operations. A pickup service is also</p>
